

Attention

- Operational Definition:
- The child demonstrates that he or she has been paying attention to the ongoing activity by being able to answer correctly within five seconds a staff member's question about the ongoing activity.
- Notes
 - Multiple parts
 - Negative behavior
 - Takes precedence over Contributing
 - Reasonable and appropriate effort

Attention Questions

- Purpose
 - To teach skills and concepts

 - To prompt attentionTo assess attention systematically

- Two types of questions
 Standardized Attention Questions
 Nonstandardized Attention Questions

Standardized Attention Questions

- Assess children's response to behavioral and medication treatments
- Same number of questions every day at the appropriate difficulty level for the child
- Adjust difficulty level as children progress

Standardized Attention Questions

• Content

- Must be the correct question for the child
- Correct level (Basic, Intermediate, Advanced) Correct wording
- Activity
 - Designated Game/Other Game
 - Group Discussion
 - Game Awareness
- Number (frequency)
 - 1 Group Discussion question (preactivity or postactivity discussion)

 - 1 Game Awareness question in Intervals 2, 3 & 4

Standardized Group Discussion Questions

- Ask questions about task-related statements made by children during the discussion.
- Use the exact wording written in the manual—Do not rephrase questions (e.g., "What was the last thing said and who said it?" or "What were the last 2 things that happened in the discussion?")
- Do not ask questions following negative child behaviors.
- Know the answer before you ask the question.

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

- Basic Level
 - Basic knowledge of game principlesAbility to attend to the immediate action of the game
- Intermediate Level
 - Knowledge of game rules and procedures
 - Ability to apply knowledge in the context of the immediate action of the game

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

Advanced Level

- Knowledge of complex game rules and procedures
- Ability to apply strategy in the context of the immediate action of the game

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

- Memorize the attention questions.
- Use the exact wording written in the manual
- Do not rephrase questions (e.g., "Why was a rule violation called?" not "Why did I blow the whistle?")
 Ask all parts of questions (e.g., "What is the score and who is winning," "What team should get possession of the ball and why?"

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

- Ask questions before calling a play
 - Assess attention to the game, not Sport Leader's statement • Examples:
 - Ask "What is the score and who is winning?" right after a player scores a goal, before announcing the new score.
 Don't ask "Why was a rule violation called?" after announcing that there was a hand ball in soccer.

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

- Ask questions at appropriate times
 - When play is stopped
 - When the game situation changes
 - Examples:
 - Do not ask a question while the child is running down the basketball court and should be watching the ball
 - Do not ask "What is the score and who is winning?" prior to the very first pitch in a softball game

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

• Ask when the answer is not readily apparent

- Examples:
 - Do not ask "How should the ball be put into play?" when a player is standing on the side of the field, prepared for a throw-in
 - Do not ask "Who scored the the goal?" when people are congratulating the player who scored.

Standardized Game Awareness Questions

Make sure Advanced questions are really Advanced

• Specific, strategy-related answers, not stock answers such as "we should have scored"

Nonstandardized Attention Questions

Content

- Any question at the incorrect level for the child
- Any question not on the question list
- Activity
 - Any question asked during a non-game period, regardless of content.
- Number (frequency)
 - Any question asked after the standardized question in a given interval

Nonstandardized Attention Questions

- Assess and test children's game knowledge
- Ask children to repeat skill drill instructions to ensure that children understand the instructions
- Ask when teaching new skills and concepts
 Increase frequency for children who have difficulty attending and understanding
- Adjust frequency and content for individual children

Nonstandardized Attention Questions

- Do not draw children off task during the activity
- Do not ask Nonstandardized questions in a manner that interferes with the Sport Leader
- Do not ask when a child has no difficulty attending to the activity or understanding concepts
